5. What is an aggravating factor in 56% of fights that lead to hospital treatment?
6. What are the 4 levels of substance-related disorders?
7. Give the Old Testament Bible reference that describes alcohol abuse.
8. What does the acronym CAGE stand for?
9. List 3 ways that you can help someone with alcohol addiction.
10. What is the author's definition of an addiction?
11. The author provides a list of 10 things that the Bible has to say about addictions. Which 3 do you think would be most helpful to help counsel a Christian who wants to overcome a drug addiction?
12. What is the concept of habituation?
13. Some drugs are more addictive than others and they fall into one of four categories. What are the 4 categories and which one of them does crack fall into?
14. Substance abuse has 4 steps toward increasing psychological disintegration. List the 4 downward steps.

16. List 4 unwise financial decisions.
